

When Felix broke up with the mother of his son, he was devastated. Overnight, he'd gone from a happy home to alone and heartbroken. A relative saw his misery and offered to "help him forget his sadness" — with drugs. In a moment of weakness, Felix accepted.

As is almost always the case, what started as a temporary release from pain turned into a raging addiction. Very quickly, Felix lost his savings, his job and his home.

For two weeks, he suffered on the streets — starving, lonely, miserable. He realized that if he didn't get help, he was going to die.

Felix Came for a Meal and Safe Shelter

When Felix was at absolute rock bottom, someone mentioned Los Angeles Mission. They said he could at least get a meal there. So he came for food and a chance to escape the dangers of the street.

While he was here, Felix saw someone he knew who'd gone through a lot of the same troubles. Only now, his friend was doing great. He was clean and sober, and there was a look of joy on his face. The Mission had restored his life, he told Felix, and it could do the same for him.

That gave Felix a glimmer of hope. Instead of returning to his addiction, Felix entered the program. He got clean, gained important life skills, grew in his faith and changed his future.

Today, Felix isn't just back on his feet. Because of your generous support, he's a completely transformed person. He has a job driving a forklift, he's rebuilding relationships with his family, and he's staying connected and accountable with the Mission. Thank you for changing Felix's life! Catching Up with Allison

Allison spent three years on the streets. She never wanted to come to the Mission. But today, thanks to your support, she's made incredible progress rebuilding her life . . .

When we last told you about Allison*, she was making good progress in the Anne Douglas Center at Los Angeles Mission, recovering from a three-year struggle with homelessness. Today, we want to share an update, because Allison's story captures both the challenges and triumphs of the recovery journey.

"Back then, I didn't want to be here," she remembers. "I was scared I was going to end up right back on Skid Row. Being out there makes you a very negative person. But since I've been at the Center, I've gained an inner peace. I know I'll never go back out there."



If not for friends like you, Allison might still be fighting to survive on Skid Row!

One of the key components to Allison's healing journey has been therapy to help her work through the trauma she suffered on the streets. "Having people to speak with, who love me for who I am, it changes everything."

This compassion, coupled with the stability, safety, Bible studies, and guidance, has transformed Allison. "There was a time when I was weak, pathetic and hopeless," she says. "I'm not any of those things anymore. Now, I'm positive, disciplined, a hard worker. I'm searching for a job, I'm rebuilding broken relationships with my family, and I have new hope for the future."




To receive the full \$125,000 amount, we must match it in its entirety by June 26. At that time, all unmatched funds will be forfeited.

Your continued gifts to Los Angeles Mission will give them meals, care and the chance at a transformed life. Thank you.


